My first guest today is Stacy Snyder, Co-Director, Digital Scholarship Studio and Network, which is located in Lockwood Library. Hi, Stacy. Tell us about what's new in DSSN for the fall.

Well, we have five or six presentations that are going to be going on. We're doing a combination of some of them will be on Zoom only and others will be hybrid. And we're leaving that up to the presenters as far as what they're interested in. So, our first one is going to be a really interesting presentation by Maria Rodriguez from the School of Social Work, talking about some Twitter research that she's been doing on bystander interventions in racist interactions online. So that's going to be really, really interesting. And then later on in September, Sarah Handley Cousins from the History Department is going to be doing DH101 for graduate students and other beginners. Because while I think a lot of us understand what Digital Humanities and Digital Scholarship are, graduate students don't necessarily know what that is, and some of them have asked, you know, they've seen our presentations, but they don't really know what DH or what DS is and how they can incorporate that into their studies and into their research.

But I'm happy to see everyone and you know, I hope that we can all be healthy and together going forward, even if that means that we're doing that with masks on.

Now I'd like to introduce Cynthia Tysick, head of the UB Library's Educational Services Team. Cindy, tell me what upcoming projects you have for the fall.

Well, for the fall, one of the big things we're going to be doing is going back into the classroom, teaching Library and Information Literacy for the English 105 courses, which is the primary writing course for the UB curriculum. So, it's about 75 separate sections of the class, roughly maybe 1500 students; freshmen that we're going to be welcoming back to UB. So, we're excited about that, and we're also rolling out a UB approved micro-credential in Digital Information Literacy. It's being offered through Coursera. We worked on it during the pandemic and we offered it simply through Coursera. But SUNY, as part of Open SUNY, allows us now to be able to reach out to all of the SUNY students and offer that micro credential through Coursera, but it will have a UB badge to it. So, we're very excited about that.

Well, it sounds really exciting. And could you offer your feelings on returning to campus full time after working remotely for the past year and a half due to COVID 19?

OK, so for the past year and a half, I work mostly on campus, except for the the early days of COVID and over the summer. So, fall of last year, I was in the classroom teaching and we had our masks, we were social distance and it was very challenging. But the students did a great job of trying to make it the best college experience. We all try to make it the best college experience, so for me, I can't wait to get back into the classroom. I can't wait to meet this new group of freshmen. I'm so excited to meet them and give them as much of a normal college experience as possible. Mask up, hopefully won't have to social distance too much because I love to walk around the classroom. And if I can't do that, I don't. I don't know. Having to be chained to the front was really difficult last year. So anyways, I'm really looking forward to welcoming everybody back to the campus. It's going to be really exciting.
