The University Libraries offer an outstanding array of information resources, technologies, services and people to support the academic and creative achievements of our students, faculty, staff and community members.

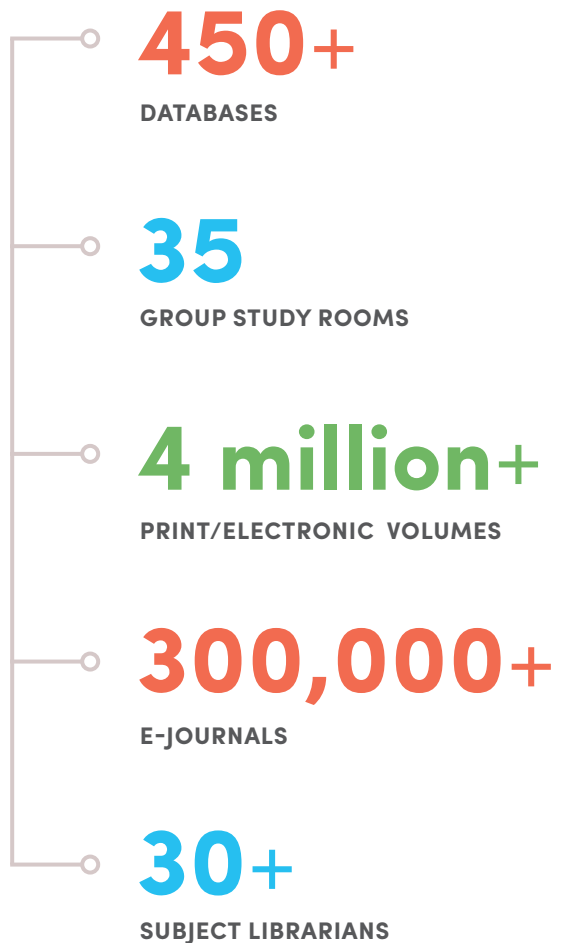
Our libraries are vibrant gathering places where you'll find books, journals, computers, media, WiFi, print kiosks and plenty of spaces for individual or group study.

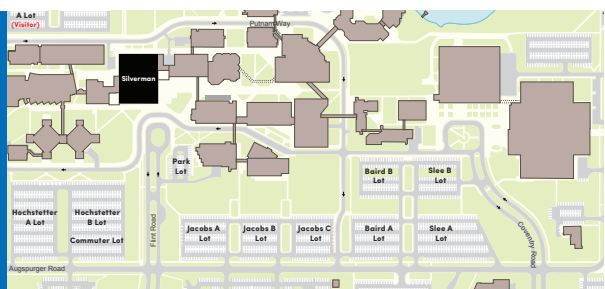
UBIT Tech Squad

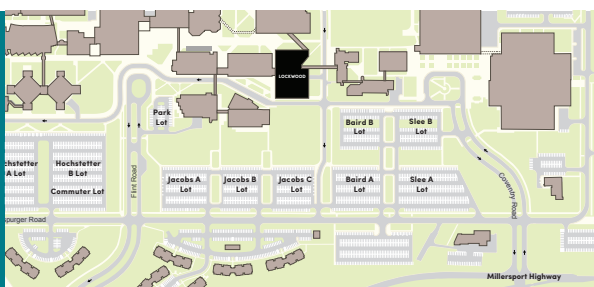

Abbott Library

Abbott Library is home to Architecture & Planning, Health Sciences, and the Robert L. Brown History of Medicine Collection. Constructed in the 1930's, this elegant limestone structure, located at the heart of the South Campus was UB's central library until the 1970's.

Law Library

The Charles B. Sears Law Library is located in the center of the UB School of Law. The Law Library's collections and services are carefully tailored to support the research and educational missions of the UB School of Law community. This beautiful facility, often referred to as "the heart of the Law School," provides a comfortable setting conducive to the study of law.

As the only research-level law library for New York State legal materials in Western New York, the Charles B. Sears Law Library is an important community resource that serves the legal information needs of the UB community, the practicing bar, and the public at large.

Collections & Services

With more than 400,000 volumes and a wide selection of online resources in legal and cross-disciplinary subjects, the Law Library offers a curated collection of material that supports UB's legal curricula and beyond. Our staff of law-trained librarians answer reference questions, teach effective research strategies, and provide crucial research services to law faculty and legal scholars at UB and across the country. With our dedicated staff, outstanding resources and services, and comfortable study spaces, UB's Law Library is well positioned to support student success.



Diverse Learning Environments

On the main level of the Law Library, you'll find comfortable café-style seating and a reading room designed for group study. The upper level, a quiet study zone, features a mezzanine that overlooks the floor below. The mezzanine is a popular spot for studying, offering a variety of seating choices such as individual study tables, larger tables arranged in a reading room layout, and seating along the mezzanine's edge.

Music Library

Located on the fifth floor of Lockwood Memorial Library, the Music Library supports the instructional and research needs of the UB Department of Music and provides support to disciplines that intersect with music. The Music Library also serves the music information needs of our local arts community and is a destination for casual listeners wishing to expand their musical horizons. We welcome all who study or simply enjoy music.

Services for Everyone

Our knowledgeable staff assists students at any stage of their academic careers through email, phone, or personalized consultations. The Music Library subscribes to a wide variety of e-resources, including streaming audio and video services. Our amenities include listening stations for in-house use of sound media and individual study carrels. A new feature in the Music Library is Piano Pods — reservable individual rooms, each with a full-size, weighted-key, Roland Digital Piano and headphones. The pianos have a USB port to allow for connection of a personal laptop and add a flash drive for storage.

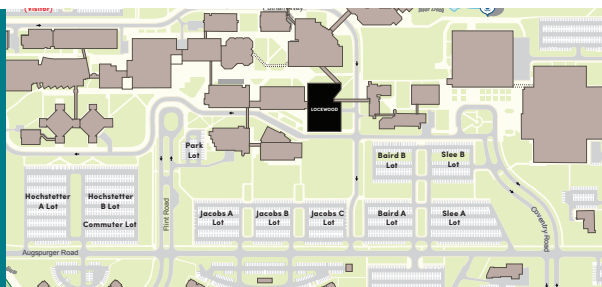

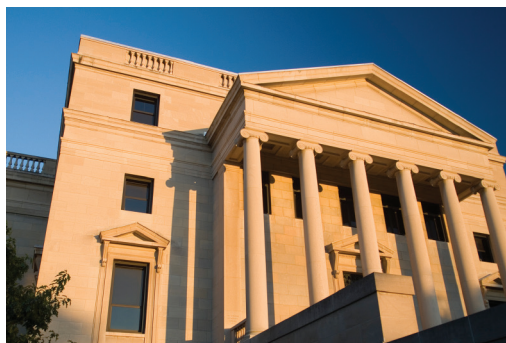


Architecture & Planning

Architecture & Planning is located on the third floor of Abbott Hall on UB's South Campus. Our collections and services support the university's School of Architecture and Planning, focusing on the fields of architecture, design, urban and regional planning, historic preservation, landscape architecture, real estate development, zoning, and urban and environmental studies.

Abbott Hall

Historic Abbott Hall, home of Architecture & Planning and the Health Sciences, was designed by noted Buffalo architect E. B. Green. Constructed in the 1930s, the elegant limestone structure, located at the heart of the South Campus, served as UB's central library until the 1970s.

Libraries Annex

The Libraries Annex, a 21,000+ square-foot, high-density storage facility, houses more than one million books and journals. This specially-constructed building includes a document delivery scanning and processing center, staff work areas, and a preservation area where conservation treatment and digitization of physical library materials takes place. Annex materials may be requested via the Libraries' *Delivery+* service.

Special Collections

Special Collections includes four units: The Poetry Collection, University Archives, Rare & Special Books and The Robert L. Brown History of Medicine Collection. Housed separately from the Libraries' regular collections, the rich literary and historical materials found in these collections make them invaluable to researchers and a distinguished part of the university.

To students and scholars, Special Collections offers a broad range of opportunities for teaching and research. Featuring books, manuscripts, documents, artifacts, and other

primary sources that enliven history and bring the past to life, many of these collections attract international attention.

These collections are "special" because of the obligations they carry for both physical care and intellectual access. Many of the materials are rare, even unique, some are very fragile, and all are susceptible to natural deterioration through time and the danger of sudden destruction or loss. The Libraries provide secure, climate-controlled facilities to ensure that our Special Collections will be preserved for future generations.

The Poetry Collection

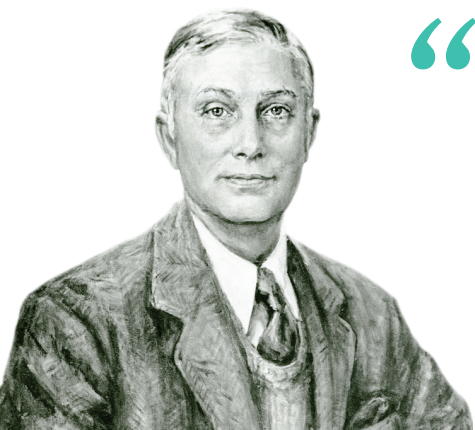

Founded in 1935 by Charles Abbott, the Poetry Collection is the library of record for 20th- and 21st-century Anglophone poetry. It is comprehensive in its collection of first and other bibliographically significant editions, little literary magazines and journals, broadsides, anthologies, criticism and reference materials. Additionally, the collection holds more than 150 archives and

manuscript collections from a wide range of organizations, presses, magazines and poets, including James Joyce, William Carlos Williams, Helen Adam, Robert Duncan, Robert Graves, Dylan Thomas and Wyndham Lewis, as well as many contemporary writers. There are also substantial collections of artwork, audio recordings, ephemera, photographs, visual poetry and zines, making it one of the largest poetry libraries of its kind in the world.

As an active research center for the study of modern and contemporary poetry, the Poetry Collection supports with its materials a wide range of scholarly publications. We open our doors to visiting researchers from around the world, loan items to exhibitions, assist with the educational activities of undergraduate and graduate students at UB and elsewhere, and host lectures, conferences, readings and other events.

We would get every edition that recorded authentic variants. And we would keep constantly in front of us the goal of completeness, that desert mirage, forever vanishing to reappear in the distance."

The University Archives houses historically valuable material related to the University at Buffalo and the surrounding Western New York area, with archival collections spanning over 16,000 linear feet. The collections in the Archives are openly available to all UB students, faculty and staff, along with community and global researchers.

The Archives collects, organizes and maintains the records of UB academic departments, administrative offices, and all university and student publications. Private papers of administrators, faculty members and other individuals associated with UB are also collected by the University Archives. Campus-related research areas include the founding of the State University of New York at Buffalo and its predecessor, the University of Buffalo (1846-1962), campus development, student experience, and departmental histories.

In addition to records and papers of the University at Buffalo, the University Archives houses over 250 historical collections on regional and national organizations, topics, events, and individuals of interest. Other research strengths include architecture and design, African American history, environment and sustainability, women's history, and Buffalo history. Collections reflect and support faculty research, provide students with research-grounded educational experiences, and deepen engagement with the regional community.

The Rare & Special Books Collection began in 1935 with the donation of Thomas B. Lockwood's collection of rare books, which includes such significant publications as four 17th-century folios of William Shakespeare; first editions of Edmund Spenser's *Fairie Queene*, John Milton's *Paradise Lost*, and Walt Whitman's *Leaves of Grass*; works by fine presses such as Kelmscott, Doves, Roycroft, and Ashendene; and other collections including presidential signatures, ancient Greek and Roman coins, and drawings by William Blake.

Comprised of over 17,000 titles, the Rare & Special Books Collection also includes other historically significant editions, incunabula, modern first editions, Julian Park's francophone collection, Joseph H. Brennan's collection of metallurgical titles, a Gran Colombia collection, Frank A. Hartman's ornithology collection, and the American Orthodox Catholic Alliance Collection.

The Robert L. Brown History of Medicine Collection includes historical materials in all areas of the health sciences, including dentistry, medicine, nursing, pharmacy and public health. Established in 1972, the collection is named in honor of Robert L. Brown, MD, former associate dean of the UB School of Medicine, in recognition of his strong support of the Health Sciences Library for over 25 years.

A highlight of the collection is the Edgar R. McGuire Historical Medical Instrument Collection which contains hundreds of medical and dental instruments and artifacts dating from the early Roman period to the late 20th Century

An important goal of the collection is to open a gateway to the history of medicine and the health sciences by acquiring, collecting, preserving and exhibiting books, instruments and educational resources from the past.

Established in 1955, the Polish Room is home to more than 12,000 volumes of Polish history and literature, including many important works on the history of Buffalo's Polish-American community. The literary and artistic materials in the Polish Room are a rich resource for students, scholars and community members interested in Poland, Polish history, and the history of Buffalo's Polonia.

Open by appointment to anyone interested in Poland and Polish-American culture, we invite you to visit in person or explore our website to learn more. Recent initiatives include digitization of selected works in the collection, making these unique materials accessible to a global audience.

To enhance access to the Libraries' rich collections, UB librarians have digitized thousands of historical photographs, print materials, audio and video recordings, artworks, and other unique materials. Our digital collections support teaching and learning activities, enrich scholarship and research, and provide access to rare or fragile items that may be too delicate to be handled regularly by the public.

Over 100 distinctive collections cover such diverse subject areas as African American studies, architecture, biology, medicine, music, poetry and psychology. The Libraries' digital collections also contain a wealth of material related to UB history, including images and text from student newspapers, yearbooks and university publications issued in decades past.

The UB Libraries' Map Collection is home to Western New York's largest and most comprehensive collection of maps and cartographic materials. The collection includes more than 450,000 maps, 6,000 aerial photos and 500 atlases, and covers all regions of the world with emphasis on Buffalo, the greater Western New York region, New York State, the U.S. and Canada.

Topographic maps for the U.S., Canada and the world, along with maps of Europe, Mexico and other areas are also included in the Map Collection. Thematic maps, illustrating features such as population, geology, landforms and water resources, are available for all regions of the world.

Open Access Publishing

The goal of open access is to improve upon the traditional scholarly publishing system by making research more visible, and therefore more impactful. Open access scholarship is freely available on the internet, and many agencies require the research they fund to be made openly available. However, there are often complicating issues like article processing charges and predatory journals. The Scholarly Publishing Librarian can assist with your open access publishing activities.

Digital Scholarship Studio and Network

Located on the third floor of Lockwood Library, the Digital Scholarship Studio and Network (DSSN) assists faculty and students who are building digital content and systems, bringing together potential research partners, and creating new research opportunities, especially for projects linking sciences, social sciences, arts and humanities.

Copyright

When using other people's content in your projects and papers or when publishing your own work, it is important to understand copyright and fair use. Contact a scholarly publishing librarian to answer your questions about publishing options, author's rights, copyright agreements and other scholarly communication issues.

Archive Your Scholarship

Archiving your scholarly output can increase your work's visibility and help assure its permanence. The easiest way for UB scholars to archive their work is to deposit it in the UB Institutional Repository (UBIR). Hosted by the Libraries, UBIR collects, preserves and distributes research and scholarship created by UB faculty, staff and students, including full-text articles, reports, images, and audio and video files (as copyright permits).

- In-library access is available to our searchable databases. Due to licensing restrictions, off-campus access is not available.

Computer Access

Guests may use visitor computer workstations for in-library access to databases, e-journals, e-books and governmental websites.
