The University at Buffalo Libraries seek a creative and collaborative **Digital Scholarship Librarian (Visiting Senior Assistant Librarian)** to develop, implement and maintain tools and services that advance digital scholarship in support of research, teaching and learning. This is a non-tenure track, two-year appointment without further reappointment. We are looking for early career professionals who can work closely with other team members to direct initiatives that will transform the Libraries into a hub of scholarly communication and who are committed to the fundamental role libraries play in the scholarly, civic and creative lives of scholars. The Digital Scholarship Librarian reports to the Head of Scholarly Communication and works with a dynamic cohort of professionals who provide leadership and coordination for the Libraries' Scholarly Communication activities.

The successful candidate will:

- Coordinate with University faculty, researchers, and students engaged in digital scholarship/humanities to define the scope, methodology, technology, specifications, and/or the design of digital projects;
- Provide consultations and instruction for faculty, students, and researchers using digital tools and computational methods supported by the Libraries;
- Support faculty and students' use of digital tools and methods in research and learning through consultations, project support, workshops and training programs, and curricular engagement;
- Explore and identify emerging platforms for textual or network analysis, geographic information systems, digital project management, and computational research; lead, develop, and promote the Libraries' relevant support services;
- Foster campus, community, and organizational engagement with the University's Digital Scholarship Studio and Network;
- Monitor and report on emerging, innovative trends and technologies, standards, publishing models, and digital scholarship/humanities developments on regional, national, and international levels.

We are looking for skilled, passionate individuals to join us in making the University Libraries a center of energy and innovation on campus. You can expect to learn continuously in a rapidly changing academic landscape. We will help you be successful by providing professional development opportunities that will benefit you and the university. Minimum Qualifications:

- Master's degree from an ALA-accredited program; degree requirement must be met at the time of application;
- Experience with and/or working knowledge of digital scholarship research tools, techniques and methodologies (e.g., data mining, data visualization, text mining, spatial analysis, etc.);
- Demonstrated ability to teach faculty, students, and staff how to use digital scholarship technology and tools;
- Demonstrated success in cultivating and developing collegial relationships with a diverse population of students, faculty, and staff;
- Demonstrated commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion in higher education with the ability to support and enhance a diverse learning and working environment;
- Excellent communication skills, demonstrated ability to work collaboratively, and strong service ethic.

Preferred Qualifications:

- One or more years of experience providing OER or open access guidance;
- Demonstrated ability to solve problems flexibly, creatively, and with a strong commitment to service excellence;
- Demonstrated ability to take initiative, be self-directed, innovate, and collaborate across organizational boundaries;
- Strong organizational, project, and time management skills to lead or coordinate multiple projects;
- Grant writing experience.
