



ONCE...

Aaron Shurin is the author of fourteen books of poetry and prose and his work has appeared in over forty national and international anthologies. A pioneer in both LGBTQ studies and innovative verse, Shurin was a member of the original Good Gay Poets collective in Boston, and later the first graduate of the Poetics Program at New College of California. He's the former director and currently Professor Emeritus for the MFA Writing Program at the University of San Francisco.
